#### Pastor Julie Krahn

Research for sermons, devotions, council reports, and all the writing I do takes me on numerous "adventures" with books, on the internet, in conversations. I love to learn. I'm inquisitive. It serves me well.

I traveled down one rabbit hole lately after reading another chapter of <u>How to Heal Our Divides: A Practical</u> <u>Guide</u>. I investigated one of the authors which took me to the 3Practices.com website where I found the link to Jim Henderson's Tedx talk, <u>Crossing the Difference</u> <u>Divide</u>. The rabbit hole seems to get deeper and deeper. :)

Henderson, a former pastor, referenced many of the divides that we experience now in America (gaystraight, pro life-pro choice, black lives matter-all lives matter, 1%-99%, saved-lost, red state-blue state). Then he cited what we agree on...85% of Americans across the political spectrum agree that our country is more divided than ever!

I feel it. I imagine you do, too.

The evidence abounds: *there is a spirit of division among us*. The nation is divided and so are our families. Neighbors are divided. Churches are divided. According to another author, "Christians around the world are not one big happy family. They are divided into various "families" who often regard one another as heretical and outside the "true faith."

Yet, what does the Bible say about division? Ephesians speaks to how we, as people living in the Spirit of Christ, are to live when surrounded by division.

"I therefore, a prisoner for the Lord, urge you to walk in a manner worthy of the calling to which you have been called, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, eager to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit—just as you were called to the one hope that belongs to your call— one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all." (Ephesians 4:1-6)

Is that true? Is there really one Church where there is a unity of the one Spirit and a bond of real, abiding peace? Yes, there is. I know it doesn't seem like it, but that is the God's honest truth. In Christ, there is one body of believers, one household of God, one family of faith, one faith and one God who is over all and through all and in all. It may not seem as if the Church of Jesus Christ is indivisible, but it is.

From God's view there is one Church. There is no such thing as an American church. Or a persecuted church. Or an African church. And no denominations either.

There is not "my church" and "your church." There is God's church. No White Evangelical, Black Pentecostal, Mainline, Asian or otherwise. The true Church has many expressions, yes, but in reality, the Church is one unified body. Let that sink in for a moment. The Church is One.

When one part suffers, all suffer. When one part celebrates, all rejoice. When one part is attacked, everyone bears the attack together. When one church closes its doors, the entire body feels the pain of it. When one church is planted, we feel energized.

Together, we are part of the body of Christ. We are integral to its proper functioning. All of us. Do you feel intimately knit into the family of God, that is, the *whole* family of God? Not just our little corner of it.

Through prayer and discernment, study and conversation, we must make every effort to maintain the body's unity through humility, gentleness, patience, mutual forbearance and love.

It always comes down to love. We've been deeply and passionately loved by God. We are called to show that same love to others – on both sides of the divide. The rabbit hole as followers of Jesus always seems to lead us to LOVE.

How can we practically love others today? For Jim Henderson, LOVE looks like crossing the difference divide using three practices: I'll be unusually interested in others; I'll stay in the room with difference; I'll stop comparing my best with your worst (versus the "gotcha" debate mode). Maybe for you, genuine love today is going to require an act of self-sacrificial forgiveness or refusing to be offended. Maybe genuine love looks like acceptance or speaking your truth in love (Eph. 4:15) even when it's hard. Maybe it looks like praying...

"God, fill \_\_\_\_(names of those you love and those with whom you think you disagree)\_\_\_\_\_ with your love and peace."

## PILL BOTTLES...PILL BOTTLES

Acceptable collection items:

- Prescription and over-the-counter pill bottles
- Large and small pill bottles
- Pill Bottles with and without secure caps (child-resistant)

Pill bottle donations should adhere to the following guidelines:

- Bottles included in shipments of medical supplies must have an all-plastic lid.
- Bottles should be sorted by color and type.
- All labels should be removed, leaving no glue or residue.
- All bottles and lids should be washed in very hot water and dish soap, rinsed, and dried thoroughly.
- Caps should be placed back onto clean, dried bottles.
- Clean, recapped bottles should be placed into large resealable bags marked "Clean Bottles." These will be included in shipments of medical supplies.

The women of the church met on Friday, April 14<sup>th</sup> at 9:30am.



St. Peter's Church is part of the Baraboo Conference within the South-Central Synod of Wisconsin, which has 14 churches in total. On April 22<sup>nd</sup>, Carolyn Meyer, Marge Schmidt and Nancy Schuette attended the Spring Gathering at Bonnet Prairie Church outside of Rio. We gathered in the sanctuary with opening prayer and song. Our guest speaker was Deb Bauer from Hope House in Baraboo. She shared staggering details of the assistance Hope House provides to five counties, Presently, Hope House helps women and children in temporary housing with up to seven rooms. If men need housing they are sheltered at local hotels. Counseling is a major resource provided.

Statistics for Sauk County assistance were the highest among the five counties. The chart below shows the various services used in 2022.

# Financial Update, by Becky Henke

#### Congregational Listening Session: Wednesday, May 24th 6:30pm

On January 22, 2023, our Annual Meeting took place. Thereafter, Council received two requests that impact our church. The first request was to amend our current Constitution removing the paragraph (C5.03.01) that prohibits St. Peter's from hiring a pastor who is in a same-sex relationship or performing of a marriage ceremony of persons in a same-sex relationship in our church. The second request's co-signers asked, "for an informational meeting about the ELCA's direction, where it's going and are entertaining the thought of leaving the ELCA synod."

Council has been discussing these requests and would like every member of this congregation to know that we will need to engage in difficult, but important, conversations, discernments, and decisions on these issues. Our hope is that everyone will be involved and engaged as we continue to figure out who we are, both our identity and our mission.

On Wednesday, May 24, 2023, we invite you to share a meal together anytime from 5:30-6:30pm. After our meal concludes at 6:30pm, we will move to the sanctuary to tackle the question "Who are we as a congregation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America?" To help us better understand our identity as an ELCA congregation, we've invited guests who have long affiliations with the ELCA. Bishop Joy and her guests have agreed to answer our questions at this Congregational Listening Session. We ask that your questions be submitted in advance so that our guests can know what you are curious about (see separate question submission page in this newsletter). Please understand that this session is for listening purposes only, so submission of your questions is important. Also, no votes of any kind can take place at an informational listening session. We hope you make time to attend because it is important that we have a common baseline of information before any decisions are made.

It is our hope that through deep listening to God and to each other, we will be able to discern where God is leading St. Peter's before a settled pastor is called. Please pray daily that we be open to the Holy Spirit's guidance and that all words and actions are grounded in the love of Christ.
